Introduction

Boise State University is a state-supported institution of higher education located within the City of Boise, Idaho. The campus encompasses approximately 272 acres, which includes academic buildings, associated auxiliary facilities, and a considerable number of outlying residence-type buildings used for academic and associated purposes. Instructional, vocational-type, and retail non-campus remote facilities are also maintained and operated in Boise, Meridian, Mountain Home, and Twin Falls, Idaho. Fraternity and sorority houses (non-campus remote facilities) are also maintained and operated in Boise, Idaho.

Over 22,678 students are enrolled at Boise State University, including 640 international students from 54 different countries. The university offers studies in nearly 200 fields of interest. Additionally, the University employs approximately 3,352 faculty and staff.

Annual Security Report

The Boise State University 2013 Security and Fire Safety Report is provided to students, faculty, staff, and the public as part of Boise State University's commitment to safety and security on campus, and in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. This report is prepared in cooperation with various Boise State departments, who provide annual updated information on their educational efforts and programs to comply with the law. Campus crime, arrests, and referral statistics includes those reported to the Campus Security and Police Services, Boise Police Department, other local law enforcement agencies surrounding non-campus and public property, and designated "campus security authorities."

The information contained in this report is to educate you of policies, procedures, and programs that exist to assist you in protecting your safety and well-being.

Campus Security & Police Services

Campus Security and Police Services operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The department is staffed with trained professional security officers and police officers. It is headed by the Executive Director of Campus Security and Police Services, who is responsible for overseeing Boise State's security program. The rest of the security team is comprised of a Security Operations Manager, Manager – Threat Assessment and Security Analysis, Security Officer Supervisor, and 7 fulltime Security Officers, as well as 10 part-time Security Officers. Boise State security officers patrol the campus 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Campus Security and Police Services is the administrative unit responsible for the functions of Boise State security officers. Primary functions include building security, grounds security, citizen assistance, and emergency response. Boise State security officers are certified in first aid, CPR, and AED. They also receive continual training throughout the year.

Campus Security and Police Services also has administrative responsibility for law enforcement activities on campus. Boise State contracts with the Boise Police Department (BPD) to provide police and security services to the university campus and community. It is responsible for law enforcement, crime prevention programs, reporting criminal activity and crime-related problems on campus, and emergency response about Boise State.

The Boise Police Department has 1 lieutenant, 6 officers, and 4 dispatchers assigned to Boise State University. One officer and one dispatcher is on-duty on campus 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Police officers have full law enforcement authority on all property owned or controlled by Boise State, including streets adjacent to and running through the Boise State campus. All police officers have completed the Peace Officers Standards & Training (POST) Academy, and received a minimum of 8 hours per month training on areas such as emergency first aid, criminal law, firearms, crisis intervention, arrest procedures, victim response, etc. Additionally, all police officers are trained as crime prevention officers. Police officers are empowered by Idaho State Law to make arrests, investigate crimes, and carry firearms on campus.

Working Relationship with Other Law Enforcement Agencies

Campus Security and Police Services maintains a close working relationship with city, county, state, and federal law enforcement agencies, as well as all appropriate elements of the criminal justice system. Crime-related reports and statistics are routinely exchanged.

Some recognized student organizations maintain either meeting and/or living facilities off campus. Through an interagency agreement between BPD and Campus Security and Police Services, any reports related to criminal activity associated with these recognized student organizations off-campus facilities are shared or reported to Campus Security and Police Services. These crime statistics are included in the non-campus crime statistics category in this report, and these criminal activity reports are subsequently shared with the appropriate university officials.

Crime Reporting Procedures

Members of the University community are encouraged to report any criminal or suspicious activities or other emergencies that occur on campus to Campus Security and Police Services immediately. To report a crime or suspicious activity, call Campus Security and Police Services at (208) 426-6911 or 9-1-1 for emergencies.

Boise State acknowledges the importance of officially reporting all crimes and will provide assistance with reporting. The University also knows that reporting a crime is different from pressing charges.

Voluntary Confidential Clery Reporting

If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the University system or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, the Campus Security & Police Services can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, the University can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, employees, and visitors; determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or assailant; and alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the institution.

Responsibilities of the University Community

Members of the University community must assume responsibility for their own personal safety and the security of their personal property. The following precautions provide guidance:

- Report all suspicious activity to Campus Security and Police Services.
- Never take personal safety for granted.
- Try to avoid walking alone at night. Use the Campus Security and Police Services escort service.
- Limit your alcohol consumption, and leave social functions that get too loud, too crowded, or that have too many people drinking excessively.
- Carry only small amounts of cash.
- Never leave valuables (wallets, purses, books, computers, phones, etc.) unattended.
- Carry your keys at all times and do not lend them to anyone.
- Lock up bicycles and motorcycles. Lock car doors and close windows when leaving your car.
- Always lock the door to your residence hall room, whether you are there or not. Be certain that your door is locked when you go to sleep, and keep windows closed and locked when you are not at home.
- Do not leave valuables in your car, especially if they can be easily noticed.
- Inventory your personal property and insure it appropriately with personal insurance coverage.

Emergency Telephones (“Blue Phones”)

A number of well-marked exterior emergency telephones are located throughout the Boise State campus. These emergency telephones are identified by a blue identifier light. These emergency direct-ring telephones have a no-charge dialer for Boise area assistance

with an identified push button for 9-1-1 emergency and police assistance. These telephones can be used to report a criminal incident, a fire, and any other type of emergency or suspicious activities.

Silent Witness/Anonymous Reporting

Campus Security and Police Services offer a way for the campus community to anonymously report threats or crimes through their website. A “Silent Witness” form may be filled out, which automatically generates an email that will be sent to Campus Security and Police Services. This program was developed to allow members of the university community to anonymously report criminal activity and other threats and/or concerns. This is not an emergency reporting form. If there is an actual emergency or involves an imminent threat to life or property, please call the Boise Police Department at 9-1-1 or Campus Security and Police Services at (208) 426-6911.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Policy

The Boise State Emergency Response Plan is designed to effectively coordinate the use of Boise State and community resources to protect life and property immediately following a major natural or man-made disaster and provide a response system for Boise State faculty, staff, and students for major disasters occurring on Boise State property. The plan is activated whenever an emergency affecting the campus cannot be controlled through normal circumstances.

The first official university responder at a disaster scene is responsible for evaluating the situation and initiating necessary communications (Campus Security & Police Services, Dispatch, Boise Police Department, etc.). First actions at the scene will be to care for the injured, and isolate the area to protect others from being exposed to known or suspected hazards.

Large incidents that pose a significant threat to life, property, or the environment may require activations of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC). The EOC shall be located at a site predetermined by the members of the Emergency Policy Group. The Executive Director of University Security Department will supervise these operations.

Once the EOC is activated, the Boise State President will be in charge and the EOC staff will coordinate all response and recovery actions. Assistance from local emergency response agencies may also be required.

The campus community will be notified immediately upon the confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees occurring on campus. Boise State will determine the content of the notification and initiate notification systems, taking into account the safety of the campus community, without delay, unless the notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist victims, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The EOC Manager (Emergency Operations Planner) will coordinate with campus and local law enforcement, campus security staff, other emergency responders, other responsible authorities, and the University Emergency Policy Group to confirm that there is a significant emergency occurring on campus, determine who to notify, determine the content of the notification, and initiate the notification systems process. The University Emergency Policy Group members consist of the following:

- President
- Provost
- Vice President, Finance and Administration
- Vice President, Student Affairs
- Vice President, University Advancement
- Vice President, Research
- Vice President & General Counsel
- Associate Vice President, Campus Planning and Facilities
- Director, Communications and Marketing

The Director of Communications and Marketing will provide emergency information to the media and the public. Notification of Boise State students, staff, and faculty will be through a menu of or by selected university notification systems. University notification systems are tested on an annual basis and include the following:

- University send word via notification system (BroncoAlert), which includes email, phone, text messaging, and voicemail
- Boise State radio and other television, radio stations, and print media
- Boise State emergency information line recorded telephone message (334-2296)
- Reverse 9-1-1 calling system
- Exterior public address system (voice and tone alerts)

Boise State policy 9220, Emergency Action and Building Evacuations Procedures, establishes Boise State's responsibilities and procedures for handling emergencies, and ensuring the safe and orderly evacuation of campus properties in the event of a natural or man-made disaster, civil disturbance, or other emergency situation. This policy also includes fire and emergency reporting procedures. Emergency evacuation drills (fire drills) are conducted on an annual basis. All drills are unannounced with the exception of drills at the Student Recreation Center. The purpose of these evacuation drills is to test emergency response, and prepare building occupants for an orderly evacuation in case of fire or other emergency. Drills are used to familiarize building occupants with emergency response and evacuation procedures, location of emergency exits, and the sound of audio tone and voice alerts. All drills are documented and are utilized to improve emergency response and evacuation procedures on campus.

In emergency situations, the succession of authority for Boise State will be as follows:

1. President
2. Provost
3. Vice President & General Counsel
4. Vice President, Finance and Administration
5. Vice President, Student Affairs

6. Vice President, University Advancement
7. Vice President, Research

Emergency Evacuation Procedures

Each Boise State building has a building coordinator, as well as an evacuation procedure. In some cases, a shelter-in-place contingency may be the best procedure to use in certain circumstances when evacuation is not a reasonable option.

Shelter-In-Place

If an incident occurs and the buildings or areas around you become unstable, or if the air outdoors becomes dangerous due to toxic or irritating substances, it is usually safer to stay indoors, because leaving the area may expose you to that danger. Thus, to “shelter-in-place” means to make a shelter of the building that you are in, and with a few adjustments, this location can be made even safer and more comfortable until it is safe to go outside.

If an incident occurs and the building you are in is not damaged, stay inside the building in an interior room until you are told it is safe to come out. If your building is damaged, take your personal belongings (purse, wallet, Bronco card, etc.) and follow the evacuation procedures for your building (close your door, proceed to the nearest exit, and use the stairs instead of the elevators). Once you have evacuated, seek shelter at the nearest University building quickly. If police or fire department personnel are on the scene, follow their directions.

A shelter-in-place notification may come from several sources, including Campus Security & Police Services, Boise Police Department, Housing staff, other Boise State employees, or other authorities utilizing the University’s emergency communication tools.

How to “Shelter-In-Place”

No matter where you are, the basic steps of shelter-in-place will generally remain the same. Should the need ever arise, follow these steps, unless instructed otherwise by local emergency personnel:

- If you are inside, stay where you are. Collect any emergency shelter-in-place supplies and a telephone to be used in case of emergency. If you are outdoors, proceed into the closest building quickly or follow instructions from emergency personnel on the scene.
- Locate a room to shelter inside. It should be:
 - An interior room;
 - Above ground level; and
 - Without windows or with the least number of windows. If there is a large group of people inside a particular building, several rooms may be necessary.
- Shut and lock all windows (tighter seal) and close exterior doors.
- Turn off air conditioners, heaters, and fans.

- Close vents to ventilation systems as you are able.
- Make a list of people with you and ask someone to call the list in to BPD so they know where you are sheltering.
- Turn on a radio or TV (if possible) and listen for further instructions.
- Make yourself comfortable.

Emergency Notification to the Community

Campus Security & Police Services receives information for different entities on campus. If Campus Security & Police Services confirms that there is an emergency or dangerous situation that poses an immediate threat to the health or safety of some or all members of the Boise State community, the Executive Director of Campus Security & Police Services or his/her designee develops and releases an emergency notification.

The following incidents will be reported by Boise State as emergency notifications, but is not all-inclusive:

- Potential life-threatening situations on the campus
- Building emergencies
- Extreme weather conditions (weather warnings)
- University closures (weather, power outages, etc.)

The following university officials have been assigned the authority by the President of Boise State to authorize emergency notifications to provide immediate notifications, including their officially designated delegates:

- Campus Security and Police Services Executive Director
- Boise State BPD Senior Officer on Duty
- Emergency Manager

The process for activating Emergency Notification procedures begins when a threat or emergency situation is reported to the Boise State Campus Security & Police Services dispatch or directly to a responsible university authority. For confirmed threats to the campus or emergency situations that require immediate notification, the responsible university authority will authorize the emergency notification based on the operational guidelines in Annex G of the Emergency Operations Plan (for more information on the EOP can be found at <http://emergencymanagement.boisestate.edu/eop/>). The Executive Director of Campus Security & Police Services and the Emergency Manager has the primary responsibility to ensure prompt issuance of an emergency notification.

Campus Security & Police Services dispatch will be the primary issuing authority for initial notification. The issuing authority has to have a responsible university authority give approval prior to sending out the emergency notification. The primary method of delivery for the emergency notification will be through BroncoALERT, which is sent to all active faculty, staff, and students through multiple electronic devices (email, text message, phone call). Detailed instructions for the issuing authority are contained within Annex G of the BSU EOP, to including messaging characteristics and ready-made templates.

An “All Clear” notification indicates the emergency situation has been contained. All clear notifications must be approved by the current Incident Commander on-scene at the incident.

How to “Opt-In”

BroncoALERT is an opt-in system; update your information with the following steps:

1. Go to MyBoiseState (<https://myboisestate.edu>)
2. Click on “Student Sign In”
3. Enter your Boise State user name and password; click on “Log In”
4. Click on “Student Center”
5. Click on the “Home” menu in the upper right hand corner
6. Click on “Opt-In to BroncoAlert” and update your information

Note: Text messaging is the quickest way to receive an alert; add a text message contact number.

Timely Warning

Boise State provides timely warning to the university community anytime criminal activity occurs on the campus on property owned or controlled by Boise State or occurring off campus, but still poses a threat to campus, which is considered to represent a serious or continuing threat to students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The Executive Director of Campus Security & Police Services or their designee (i.e. Boise Police Department Lieutenant, Emergency Management or University Communications & Marketing) is responsible for developing and releasing timely warning notices for the university. Timely warnings are not limited to violent crimes or crimes against persons; they should be issued for any continuing danger to the campus community.

The following incidents will be reported by Boise State as timely warning incidents, but is not all-inclusive:

- Criminal Homicide
- Aggravated assault (cases involving assaults among known parties, such as two roommates fighting which results in an aggravated injury, will be evaluated on a case by case basis to determine if the individual is believed to be an on-going threat to the larger Boise State community)
- Robbery involving force or violence (cases including pick pocketing and purse snatching will typically not result in the issuance of a timely warning, but will be assessed on a case by case basis)
- Sexual Assault (considered on a case by case basis depending on the facts of the case, when and where the incident occurred, when it was reported, and the amount information known by University Security & Police Services)
- Major incidents of arson
- Other crimes as determined necessary by the Executive Director of University Security & Police Services, or his or her designee in his or her absence.

The description of subject(s) in a case will only be included in the alert if there is a sufficient amount of detail to describe the individual. If the only known descriptors are sex and race, that will not be included in the alert.

Campus Security and Police Services will draft an email containing the proposed alert and forward it to University Communications and Marketing, the Vice President/General Counsel, the Vice Present/Student Affairs, and the Chief of Staff of the President's Office. The proposed alert will review and revise the text as needed. The alert will then be transmitted via email to students, faculty, and staff. Updates to the Boise State community about any particular case resulting in a crime alert also may be distributed electronically via BroncoMail or posted on the University's website. The Vice President/General Counsel or the Chief of Staff of the President's Office will review the alert and may distribute the notice to Trustees, Officers, or Staff, as deemed necessary and appropriate.

Timely warnings may also be posted in campus buildings, when deemed necessary. When an alert is posted in campus buildings, it should be printed on colored paper and be posted in the lobby/entrance area of the effected building(s) for seven (7) days. A list of the buildings where timely warning may be posted is maintained by Campus Security & Police Services.

Campus Security & Police Services may not issue a timely warning for the above listed crimes if:

- The department apprehends the subject(s) and the threat of imminent danger for members of the Boise State community has been mitigated by the apprehension.
- If a report was not filed with Campus Security & Police Services or the department was not notified of the crime in a manner that would allow the department to post a "timely" warning for the community.
 - A general guideline will include any report that is filed more than five days after the date of the alleged incident.
 - This type of situation will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

Campus Security & Police Services also maintains a daily crime log, which is updated each business day and contains all crimes reported to Campus Security & Police Services. The information is posted on the university's website, kept as a hard copy in the Campus Security & Police Services' office, and in the annual Security and Fire Safety Report.

Security & Access to Campus Facilities

Boise State University is state-owned property and, as such, is open to the public. The academic and administrative buildings are open to the public, at a minimum, during normal business hours. Most facilities have individual hours, and the hours may vary at different times throughout the year. Access to some of these buildings is also controlled by card access after normal business hours, and all of these buildings have varied levels of access.

Campus Security & Police Services patrols the academic, administrative, and housing buildings on a regular basis. For information about the access protocol for a specific building, see the building coordinator, a department head, or contact Campus Security & Police Services at (208) 426-6911.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Boise State maintains a strong commitment to campus safety and security. Exterior lighting is an important part of this commitment. Motor vehicle parking lots, pedestrian walkways, and building exteriors are well lit. Formal surveys of exterior lighting on campus are conducted by Boise State security officers on a bi-weekly basis, and this report is directed to the Facilities Operations & Maintenance Department for appropriate action. Members of the campus community are encouraged to report any exterior lighting deficiencies to the Facilities Operations & Maintenance Department at (208) 426-1375.

A cooperative effort by Campus Security and Police Services, Facilities Operations & Maintenance Department custodial personnel, and building occupants is utilized in surveying exterior doors. The purpose of this program is to ensure that each exterior door and its locking mechanism are working properly. Exterior doors on campus are locked and secured each evening by building occupants, custodial personnel, and Boise State security officers. Door and security hardware operating deficiencies are reported by these personnel to the Facilities Operations & Maintenance Department on a daily basis.

The maintenance and security of campus buildings for safety of users spans the areas of key control, maintenance of door hardware, replacement of broken windows, fire protection, fire drills, hazardous waste policy, ventilation, life safety items, etc.

Shrubbery, trees, and other vegetation on campus are trimmed on a regular basis. Trimming is done to a level to expose individuals with criminal intent who may use such vegetation for disguise or hiding purposes. Where trimming is not effective, this vegetation is removed from the campus. Facilities Operations & Maintenance Department personnel and Campus Security and Police Services continually survey the campus grounds to ensure that a safe environment exists.

Campus buildings, parking lots, and other ground areas are actively patrolled by the Boise State security officers and BPD officers, as well as by parking patrol.

Crime Statistics

The crimes that were previously in the Main Campus statistics were taken out, so there is a difference in the non-campus property section charts in previous annual reports.

Crimes are calculated per Clery requirements. When counting multiple offenses, Boise State uses the FBI's *UCR* Hierarchy Rule. This rule requires that only the most serious offense is counted when more than one offense was committed during a single incident. Additionally, if an incident occurs in Housing property, it will be counted twice: once in the "On Campus" section and once in the "Residential Facilities" section.

Missing Students

Residential students who become aware of a missing residential student must report this to one of the following:

- University housing through the resident assistant (residence halls) or community assistant (apartments) charged with the responsibility for the floor/area where the missing student resides

- University housing through the resident director charged with the responsibility for the building/apartment complex where the missing student resides
- Campus Security & Police Services

All Boise State residential students are required to provide an emergency contact to University housing. If it is determined that a student is missing, Campus Security & Police Services shall be notified. Only authorized campus officials and law enforcement officers in furtherance of a missing person investigation may have access to this emergency contact information.

All students who live in campus housing other than University apartment communities receive information that a parent or guardian will be notified in the event of an emergency. This includes students less than 18 years of age who are not emancipated. Students over the age of 21 have the option to list an emergency contact other than a parent or guardian. Regardless if a student names a contact person, the institution must notify the local law enforcement that the student is missing, unless local law enforcement was the entity that determined the student was missing.

All live-in residence hall staff members are instructed to immediately report missing students to their supervisor (i.e. the resident director) of each facility. Resident directors will then enact the missing person protocol, which includes notifying Campus Security and Police Services.

Firearms & Weapons Possession (Boise State Policy #12080)

A safe and secure environment is fundamental to fulfilling the University's mission of teaching, research, and public service. Boise State University is committed to maintaining an environment free of violence. This obligation includes restricting recognized hazards from the campus community that contribute to violence or serious harm.

The possession, wearing, carrying, transporting, or use of a weapon is strictly forbidden on Boise State owned or controlled premises, including vehicles parked on such premises. This prohibition extends to any person with a government-issued permit or license. Violation of this policy may result in disciplinary action and sanctions up to and including exclusion or expulsion (in the case of students), exclusion or dismissal from employment (in the case of faculty and staff), or exclusion from campus (in the case of the public). Any questions regarding granting of exceptions to individuals or organization in addition to those specifically listed should be addressed to the Executive Director of University Security Department. No authorization period shall extend for more than one year.

A weapon is defined as any animate or inanimate device, instrument, material, or substance used for, or is readily capable of, causing death or serious bodily injury. Any device that is "deadly or dangerous" under Idaho Code § 18-3302D(2)(a), as well as replicas or facsimiles that may be perceived as a weapon. Includes incendiary devices and explosives.

The following are exceptions to this policy:

- The lawful possession of weapons by full-time sworn peace officers, reserve officers, and federal law enforcement agents (whether in uniform or off-duty/plain clothes with proper identification). Also included in the exception are on-duty armored transport personnel.
- The lawful possession of firearms by qualified retired law enforcement officers, as such officers are defined in 18 U.S.C. § 926C.
- A weapon in the possession of a person who has received prior written authorization from the Executive Director of Campus Security and Police Services.
- The lawful possession of a weapon by members of the Reserve Officer's Training Corps (ROTC) program, when directed by a provision of the program and with permission of the Executive Director of Campus Security and Police Services.
- The Executive Director of Campus Security and Police Services may, at their direction and in writing, authorize specific individuals to bring weapons on university property for specific events and purposes.
- Personal protection pepper spray, i.e. Oleoresin Capsicum (OC), may be carried on campus.

Alcohol and Drug Policies

Boise State wishes to encourage a chemically healthy environment for its students, employees, and guests. To this end, the university: (1) has developed policies and procedures regarding a drug-free workplace; (2) promotes education and training programs, both internally and externally, regarding alcohol and other drug use/abuse; (3) implemented an employee assistance program; (4) provides wellness programs and activities for employees and students; and (5) participates in numerous community support and resource based programs.

In the interest of the personal health and safety of the campus community, Boise State University will not condone or ignore alcohol or drug abuse. Boise State enforces alcohol laws, including state underage laws. Further, the illegal manufacture, distribution, dispensation, or possession of a controlled substance on university owned or controlled property will not be tolerated.

Boise State will assist members of the campus community who are experiencing problems with alcohol or other drugs in making informed decisions about appropriate use, as well as the adverse consequences of alcohol or drug abuse on one's health and behavior.

Boise State prohibits illegal possession, consumption, manufacture, and distribution of alcohol and other drugs by students in college or university owned, leased, or operated facilities and on-campus grounds. Exceptions to this may be found in Boise State policy #1050. Any individual that violates the policies stated in the code of conduct in the student handbook may be subject to any or all of the following: expulsion, suspension, conduct probation, censure, and/or restitution or compensation. There are additional and more specific Housing & Residence Life (HRL) policies regarding alcohol use and definitions of violations in our residence Halls and Apts. For more information, see Housing's policies and procedures at <http://housing.boisestate.edu/policiesprocedures/>.

Boise State is committed to the development and maintenance of an alcohol and other drugs free environment in accordance with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, 34CFR Part 85, and Boise State University policy, and will not tolerate the unlawful possession and/or use of a controlled substance (alcohol or any other drug) on its premises. The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in and on Boise State University owned or controlled property by faculty, staff, or student employees. If Boise State policy #12040 is violated, the employee will be subject to disciplinary action (up to and including suspension, suspension without pay, and termination), and may be required to satisfactorily participate in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program as agreed upon between the employee, the Human Resources Director, and the Employee Assistance Program provider. Applicable legal sanctions for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol:

1. Illicit drugs include, but are not necessarily limited to, LSD, mescaline, crack, cocaine, speed, marijuana, heroin, peyote, and those controlled substances listed under schedules I, II, and III in Idaho State Code Title 37, Chapter 27.
2. Penalties for the use, unlawful possession, or distribution of illicit drugs are both serious and complex. They range from a misdemeanor penalty of a \$300.00 fine or 6 months in jail to a life term in the Idaho Penitentiary for previous offenders and certain categories of drug dealers. You should know that Idaho judges are required in many cases to perform mandatory sentencing of convicted persons. A felony is a crime, the penalty for which may be incarceration in a state penitentiary, or a fine not to exceed \$25,000, or both. The penalties for use and/or distribution may be found in Idaho State Code Title 37, Chapter 27. Federal penalties for the use, possession, or distribution of illicit drugs are similarly severe and complex. Federal judges are empowered to sentence offenders to a federal penitentiary, or to mete out substantial fines, depending on the offense, drug classification, and other factors.
3. The abuse or illegal possession of alcohol is proscribed under Idaho Law. You must be 21 years of age or older in Idaho in order to purchase, possess, or consume an alcoholic beverage. If a person's blood alcohol content exceeds 0.08, it is unlawful to drive any motor vehicle, and a first offense can result in penalties of 6 months in jail and/or a fine of \$1,000.00. Driving privileges can also be suspended or revoked. There are also laws prohibiting public intoxication or possession of alcohol by a person less than 21 years of age.

Sexual Assault Prevention and Response

Introduction

Boise State exists to educate people to become knowledgeable citizens who are actively involved in the communities where they live. Critical to the development of this educated citizenry is fostering an atmosphere of respect and civility. Any form of harassment or sexual assault is contrary to these values and the mission of Boise State and will not be tolerated.

All members of the Boise State community must be able to pursue their goals, educational needs, and working lives without intimidation or injury.

Every member of the Boise State community should be aware that Boise State is strongly opposed to sexual harassment and sexual assault and that such behavior is prohibited by both federal and state law, as well as Boise State policy. It is the intention of the university to take whatever action may be needed to prevent, correct, and, if necessary, discipline behavior that violates this policy.

All forms of sexual assault and all attempts to commit such acts are regarded as serious university offenses, which may result in suspension or expulsion. Prosecution for the criminal law violation may also take place independently of charges under university regulations.

Many survivors of sexual assault struggle to identify what has happened to them. Sometimes, it takes days or even weeks before a person can think clearly and recognize that they have experienced a sexual assault. It is important to seek help regardless of how long ago a trauma may have occurred. Hopefully, these guidelines here can help you identify what happened to you and the option you have.

Victim's Bill of Rights

You have the right to...

- Be informed of all reporting options.
- Be free from pressure to make a criminal report.
- Have any allegations of sexual assault investigated and adjudicated by the appropriate campus, civil, and criminal authorities.

- Be notified of existing campus and community medical, counseling, and mental health services whether or not the crime is reported to campus or civil authorities.
- Receive, when required, the full, prompt cooperation of campus personnel when obtaining, securing, and preserving evidence.

Sexual Assault Response Guarantee from University Security

To report a sexual assault that occurs on campus, call University Security Department at (208) 426-6911. In an emergency situation, always dial 9-1-1. Campus police services are provided through a contract with local police services; police officers are fully trained in working with victims of sexual assault and know the requirements for preserving evidence. People who have been victimized can be guaranteed of quality service.

What victims can expect:

- We will meet with you privately or at a place of your choice to file a complaint report.
- We will not release your name to the public or press. Crime statistics and incidents are made public record, but any identifying information will be withheld.
- Our officers will not prejudge you, and you will not be blamed for what occurred.
- We will treat you and your particular case with courtesy, sensitivity, dignity, understanding, and professionalism.
- If you have a preference for either a female or male officer, we will do our best to accommodate your request.
- We will assist you in receiving hospital, medical, counseling, and other support services that are available.
- We will fully investigate your case and will help you to achieve the best outcome. This may involve the arrest and full prosecution of the suspect(s). You will be kept informed of the progress of the investigation and/or prosecution.
- We will consider your case seriously, regardless of your gender and sexual orientation, and regardless of the gender and sexual orientation of the suspect(s).

Defining Sexual Misconduct

The term “sexual misconduct” encompasses the legal definitions of rape contained in Idaho State Law, as well as any sexual act committed against the wishes of another person. It can include force, either physical or psychological, but the use of force is not prerequisite to the finding of sexual misconduct. Sexual misconduct includes a range of behaviors from sexual harassment to rape. Idaho State Law has specific definitions that you can access at <http://www3.state.id.us/idstat/TOC/idstTOC.html>. However, Boise State recognizes that there are many more behaviors that violate others and that is covered by our Student Code of Conduct.

Sexual misconduct includes, but is not limited to the following:

1. **Sexual Harassment:** This includes a pattern of unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct or communication of a sexual nature when:
 - a. Submission to such conduct or communication is made a term or condition either explicitly or implicitly of employment, services, housing, or education, including status in a course, program, or activity.
 - b. Submission to or rejection of such conduct or communication is used as a factor in decisions affecting an individual's employment, reception of service, housing, or participation in a course, program, or activity.
 - c. Such conduct or communication has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with an individual's work, housing, or performance in a job, course, program, or activity, or it creates an intimidating and hostile work, living, or educational environment.

It may include, but is not limited to the following:

- Threats or insinuations that lead the victim to reasonably believe that granting or denying sexual favors will affect his or her reputation, education, employment, or advancement.
- Repeated phone calls, email messages, or text messages from someone who has a crush on you, though you clearly have indicated that you have no interest.
- Continuous references to sexual activity and sexual terms that make you uncomfortable.
- Unwelcome and persistent sexually explicit statements or stories that are not related to employment duties, course content, research, or other Boise State programs or activities.
- Repeatedly using sexually degrading words, gestures, or sounds to describe a person.
- Recurring comments or questions about an individual's sexual orientation.

Sexual harassment can occur with any combination of genders and sexual orientation.

2. **Sexual Battery:** This includes intentionally touching the person's intimate parts (primarily genital area, groin, inner thigh, buttock, or breast) without or against the person's consent. This touching is either directly on the body part or on the clothing covering that body part. It is also sexual battery if the person is forced to touch the intimate areas of another individual. Sexual battery can occur with any combination of genders and sexual orientations.
3. **Sexual Assault:** This includes any sexual act carried out without or against a person's consent, under coercion, with the threat of force, or by using or employing a weapon, through a position of authority, or when the victim/survivor is mentally disabled or physically helpless including by reason of drug or alcohol consumption, sleep, or unconsciousness. Sexual assault includes, but is not limited to, verbal threats that coerce, force, intimidate, threaten, or persuade someone to engage in unwanted sexual activity. Sexual assault can occur with any combination of genders and sexual orientations.

The Boise State Code of Conduct, Article 3, defines sexual assault as the following (note: current criminal law and Boise State policy may differ in definition.: *Section 8 – Sexual Harassment and/or Sexual Assault: Any actions or statements of a sexual nature that are abusive, intimidating, harassing, or embarrassing along with implied or stated threats are prohibited. This policy includes, but is not limited to: unwanted touching or comments, retaliation, threats of violence, use of violence, and sexual assault. Sexual assault can occur with any combination of genders and sexual orientations.*

The Clery Act, originally enacted by Congress and signed into law by President George Bush in 1990 as the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990, was championed by Howard & Connie Clery after their daughter, Jeanne, was murdered at Lehigh University in 1986. They also founded the non-profit Security On Campus, Inc., in 1987. Amendments to the Act in 1998 renamed it in memory of Jeanne Clery.

4. **Rape:** This includes attempted or actual penetration, no matter how slight, of the genital, anal, and/or oral openings of a person by any part of another person's body or by the use of an object, without the person's consent or against the person's will. Rape includes sexual contact, consensual or not, with a minor (under 18 years of age). Rape can occur with any combination of genders and sexual orientations.

Understanding Sexual Assault

A stranger, an acquaintance, or a family member can commit sexual assaults. According to the Department of Justice report, "Ninety percent of college women who are victims of rape or attempted rape know their assailant. The attacker is usually as classmate, friend, boyfriend, ex-boyfriend, or other acquaintance (in that order)." Victims of sexual assault can be women or men, and sexual assault can occur between individuals of the same gender. While more than 90% of victims are women, men are also sexually assaulted and raped, usually by other men; 98% of men who rape other men identify themselves as heterosexual in consensual sexual relationships.

"Acquaintance rape" is a common term used to describe sexual assaults by someone the victim is acquainted with or knows. However, many organizations are challenging this term, recognizing that it may "soften" the reality of the criminal act. Rape is rape, whether it is committed by a stranger or an acquaintance.

There are many philosophies about the nature of sexual assaults, but most advocates agree that sexual assault is not about sex, per se. According to Susan Brownmiller in *Against Our Will: Men, Women, and Rape*, rape is a crime of violence, not of passion.

Sexual assault is never the fault of the victim. Offenders are always responsible for the choice to assault someone else. The only person that can prevent this crime from occurring is the perpetrator of it.

Procedures for Reporting a Sexual Assault

If a sexual assault occurs, safety and medical assistance are the first considerations:

1. Go to a safe place as soon as possible.
2. Call 9-1-1 to report a crime or call Boise State Security Department at (208) 426-6911 to receive information and resources in a confidential manner. You can also call the Violence Awareness and Response Coordinator at the Boise State Women's Center at (208) 426-4259. The coordinator can meet with you or talk with you on the phone to provide options about police reporting, medical and counseling services, student conduct option, and other resources available.
3. It is important to preserve physical evidence of any assault, especially if the victim seeks to prosecute the offender. Evidence collection is best done within 72 hours of the assault and best collected immediately following an assault. Technological advancements are making it more likely to collect evidence even after 72 hours; however, it is important to remember that the more time passes between the sexual assault and reporting it to the police, the less likely it will be to collect physical evidence that may be very important to the prosecution of a criminal case. Victims of sexual assault should not shower or bathe, wash hands, use the toilet, change clothing, or wash clothing or bedding. If the victim has changed clothes and is at a location other than the crime scene, carefully place all clothing and/or bedding worn at the time into a paper bag for the police.
4. Seek medical attention. FACES (located at 417 S. 6th Street, phone number: 208-577-4400) is a specialized facility close to campus that conducts sexual assault exams with experienced SAFE nurses and physicians. You can also go to an emergency room at St. Alphonsus or St. Luke's hospitals; both have response teams specially trained to assist victims of sexual assault.
5. When an incident is reported, a police detective will come to the emergency room to talk to you and will be accompanied by a Victim-Witness Coordinator (a female employee of the city/county that works with investigating law enforcement agency and the prosecuting attorney's office to assist you through the judicial process).
6. At the hospital, a "rape kit," or forensic examination, can be administered to gather evidence in the event of prosecution. This procedure includes a physical exam where a doctor collects the evidence of the assault.
7. Students may also file a complaint through the campus judicial proceedings. Boise State does not require this type of physical evidence to file a complaint through the Student Conduct Program.
8. A criminal investigation may occur separate from a judicial proceeding on campus if the offender is a member of the Boise State community.
9. Seek counseling or other support. There are many services available on campus and in the community to support students in crisis. In Boise, there is also a 24-hour crisis line (208-343-7025) operated through the Boise Women's and Children's Alliance (WCA) and is available to respond to anyone's concerns and provide referral information. You may also call Boise State Counseling Services at (208) 426-1601 during weekday business hours. Remember, it is important that victims of sexual assault seek medical treatment immediately and get counseling as soon as possible, regardless of whether or not a report of the incident is made to the police.

Information Sharing and Reporting

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, codified at 20 USC 1092 (f) as part of the Higher Education Act of 1965, is a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose certain timely and annual information about campus crime and security policies. All public and private institutions of post-secondary education participating in federal student aid programs are subject to it. Violators can be fined up to \$35,000 or face other enforcement action by the US Department of Education, the agency charged with enforcement of the Act and where complaints of alleged violations should be made.

Boise State University acknowledges the importance of officially reporting all crimes and will provide assistance with reporting. Boise State also knows that reporting a crime is different from pressing charges. As provided under federal law, the university requires that all Boise State administrators, officials, employees, and faculty report any and all crimes that students may report to them. When the student reports a crime in confidence, it may be reported anonymously to Campus Security and Police Services. Professional and religious counselors are exempt from these reporting requirements. However, the University encourages anonymous reporting when, at the discretion of the counselor, they feel it's appropriate. The university stresses the importance of supporting victims whether or not they choose to press charges. In regards to sexual misconduct, these are crimes we are required to report:

- Sex Offenses, Forcible
 - Forcible rape
 - Forcible sodomy
 - Sexual assault with an object
 - Forcible fondling
- Sex Offenses, Non-Forcible
 - Incest
 - Statutory rape

Disciplinary Proceeding Results

Boise State University will, upon written request, disclose to the alleged victim of a crime of violence or a non-forcible sex offense, the report on the results of any disciplinary proceeding conducted by the institution against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of such crime or offense. If the alleged victim is deceased as a result of such crime or offense, the next of kin of such victim shall be treated as the alleged victim for purposes of this paragraph.

On-Campus Services and Support

Campus Security and Police Services

In compliance with federal Student-Right-to-Know Act and Campus Security Act of 1990, Campus Security and Police Services will notify the campus community of any sex offenses reported to them without using the names of the victim (see [Timely Warning](#) section). These statistics appear in the annual crime report available through University Security or on their web site: <http://security.boisestate.edu/>. Reporting the assault to Campus Security and Police Services may help the university investigator identify the offender and prevent victimization of other people. University Security will provide confidentiality to the parties involved. However, the Executive Director of University Security is required to inform the Vice President for Student Affairs and the Women's Center Coordinator of the incident.

Campus Security and Police Services is located at 2245 University Drive, Boise, Idaho 83725. They can be reached by phone (208) 426-6911, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. In emergency situations, call 9-1-1. Additional information can be found on their website: <http://security.boisestate.edu/>.

The Women's Center

The Women's Center is staffed by a full-time coordinator and a Violence Awareness and Response Coordinator (VARC), who can assist students with initial consultation and information about available services. Students seeking assistance at the Women's Center are not making a report or a formal complaint. Where practical, all discussions are private and confidential and do not commit students to further action. However, if it is determined that an imminent threat to community safety exists (for example, a serial rapist), action may be taken to protect the community members from further harm; this would be done in consultation with the victim with great sensitivity and discretion. At the request of the student, female or male staff will contact the police, health and counseling services, local women's shelter, or any other appropriate agency while acting as an advocate in the process. The Women's Center does not investigate or adjudicate complaints of sexual assault or rape; rather, the staff works to support a student who has been victimized, at his or her request, through the system as the investigation occurs. If the student chooses not to formally report the crime, the only information that will be shared with Campus Security and Police Services is that a sexual assault was reported; no names and specific information will be given. Boise State University must comply with the federal Student-Right-To-Know Act, which requires reporting these statistics.

The Women's Center is located in the Student Union Building on the second floor. They can be reached by phone (208) 426-2459, 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday. Additional information can be found on their website: <http://womenscenter.boisestate.edu/>.

University Health Services

Counseling services provides "crisis intervention" for students who have experienced any upsetting situations (e.g., traumatic events, rape, health problems, unplanned pregnancy). Students should call (208) 426-1601 or come into the Norco Building at 1529 Belmont Street. If students seek care at University Health Services, a trained provider (physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or registered nurse) will assist them.

If a sexual assault has occurred within 72 hours, students will be referred to the local emergency facility for evaluation and treatment (to gather evidence and ensure the proper chain-of-custody of evidence). If the student chooses to decline the referral to an emergency facility, they may be evaluated at University Health Services. Emergency contraception and testing for sexually transmitted infections are available.

All information is private and confidential. Health care providers who are made aware of any criminal act, including sexual assault, are required by the federal Student-Right-To-Know Act to report it to the appropriate criminal investigative agency. If the student chooses not to formally report the crime, the only information that will be shared with University Security Department is that a sexual assault was reported – what, when, and where the assault occurred, but it would not include the names or the victim(s) or assailant(s).

The University Health Services is located at 1529 Belmont Street, Boise, Idaho 83725. They can be reached by phone at (208) 426-1601, 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Housing and Residence Life Office

The residence halls are staffed by full-time, professional hall directors who supervise a student staff of resident assistants, trained to assist students with resources and referrals. Staff members receive training on how to supportively assist victims of sexual assault and will help connect students with vital support services. In such matters, resident assistants are required to inform their hall director to ensure the appropriate action is taken regarding the student's concerns.

Student Conduct Program (Office of the Dean of Students)

The Student Conduct Program is through the Office of the Dean of Students. The Student Code of Conduct exists to assist in the effort of providing the best possible learning and living environment for all students. It is the obligation of students to treat all other members of the academic community with dignity and respect, including other students, faculty members, employees, visitors, and neighbors of the University. The enforcement of campus rules is critical to the existence of such an environment for all members of the academic community.

The Student Conduct Program is a resource for students, faculty, and staff to utilize in holding Boise State students accountable for misbehavior without the requirement of filing legal charges. People may file complaints of sexual assault or other acts of misconduct through the Student Conduct Program by scheduling a meeting with the student conduct officer at (208) 426-1527.

Off-Campus Services and Support

The Women's and Children's Alliance (WCA)

Since 1980, the non-profit WCA has been in the forefront of protecting women and children escaping violent circumstances. The WCA also helps these vulnerable individuals build safer, better lives. The WCA Crisis Center's secure residential shelter is devoted exclusively to abused women and their children from Ada, Boise, Elmore, and Valley counties. The agency also provides uniquely comprehensive local support services to those affected by domestic and sexual violence. The staff provides counseling and advocacy (both in the hospital and at court). Presentations and awareness seminars are available upon request.

Prevention and Risk Reduction

Typically, the term "primary prevention" is used to describe educational efforts directed at trying to prevent crime from occurring. Since men commit 99% of all sexual assaults, these types of prevention activities are typically focused on ways men can reduce and prevent gender violence against women and other men. Jackson Katz (www.jacksonkatz.com), a leading male anti-violence activist who came to Boise State in 2004, focuses his research and work on primary prevention. For example, some of Katz's primary prevention programs

teach men ways to confront peers and interrupt violence they may see, and to teach men how to be better allies to the women in their lives. Katz has also produced numerous films and programs that discuss the way society “creates masculinity” and promotes sexual violence and aggression among men in the culture. These educational activities are geared at deconstructing stereotypes and teaching concrete ways to stop, interrupt, and prevent violent acts from being committed.

“Risk reduction” programs typically focus on ways victims (who are predominantly women) can examine the “culture of rape” in our society and identify potentially harmful situations and risks. In this way, it is believed that a potential victim could “reduce the risk” of being sexually assaulted. For example, self-defense classes and safety programs examine the tactics that perpetrators use to compromise situations and force or coerce attacks. These programs allow women in particular to learn and practice physical self-defense tactics to fight off an attacker. However, these methods will not prevent an attacker from committing acts of violence. As another example, alcohol is the most common drug used by attackers on their victims. Some attackers intentionally “feed” victims drinks to get them drunk in order to rape them. Knowing this, one may try to “reduce the risk” of assault by not accepting multiple drinks to avoid getting drunk and being sober, therefore, more likely to resist an attack. It has been noted in a Department of Justice Community Policing Report that in over 75% of rapes on college campuses, the offender, the victim, or both had been drinking. However, alcohol is not the cause of sexual assault, and the offender who is under the influence is always responsible for behavior that harms another person.

It is essential to recognize the difference in prevention and risk reduction activities and to offer both types of models on campus. As an on-going effort, Boise State will provide a variety of sexual assault prevention and risk reduction programs during the school year. In efforts to increase awareness about the issues of sexual assault and rape, staff members will make themselves available to any student organizations and departments that would like additional information or presentations regarding sexual assault. You can contact Campus Security and Police Services at (208) 426-6911, the Women’s Center at (208) 426-4259, or Counseling Services at (208) 426-1601 to request a special presentation for your organization.

Title IX Coordinator

Individuals may also report a sex offense to the University’s Title IX Coordinator. This individual is responsible for coordinating the University’s compliance with Title IX. The Title Coordinator may be contacted in the Office of the Dean of Student, located in the Norco Building, Room 116 (208-426-1527).

Sex Offender Registry

In accordance to the “Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act” of 2000, the Jeanne Clery Act and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, Campus Security and Police Services is providing a link to the Idaho State Police Sexual Offender Registry. This act requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community

where law enforcement information provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice of each institution of higher education in that State at which the person is employed, carries a vocation, or is a student. Campus and Workplace Violence

Threat Assessment (Boise State Policy #12030)

Everyone is responsible for reporting threats they have witnessed, received, or have been told that another person has witnessed or received. Minus an actual threat, any witnessed-behavior regarded as threatening or violent, when that behavior is school-related or might be carried out on a university-controlled site, or is connected to University employment, should be reported.

Those who believe there exists an immediate danger to the health and safety of a member of the university community should immediately call 9-1-1. If a member of the campus community is concerned about a threat of violence, they should document the reason for their concern and discuss it with their supervisor, administrator, department chairperson, Campus Security and Police Services, the Dean of Student's Office, or HRS as appropriate.

Occasionally, an individual's behavior or demeanor may cause fear or concern. In such cases of apprehension, it is important to tell someone in authority so it can be documented, evaluated, and handled appropriately.

Unless a privileged relationship exists, this report should be made regardless of the relationship between the individual who demonstrated threatening behavior and the person(s) who were threatened or focus of the threatening behavior.

Actual Threats

- Report immediate dangers to health and safety to 9-1-1.
- Report threats to Campus Security and Police Services (426-6911), who will conduct an investigation.
- Notify supervisor, administrator, or department chairperson.
- Notify the C.A.R.E. Team via their website by submitting a C.A.R.E. report.

While Campus Security and Police Services are the lead unit in conducting investigations and evaluating threats, in some instances, they may promptly refer the matter to another unit as appropriate.

Off-Campus Incidents

The university should be made aware of threats made off-campus toward a member of the campus community even if by persons not affiliated with the university. So appropriate measures can be taken, employees must report threats or court-ordered action that may affect the safety of the university community to their supervisor and Campus Security and Police Services.

Protective or Restraining Orders

Those who have applied for or obtained a protective or restraining order that lists university locations as being protected areas must provide to the Campus Security and Police Services a copy of the petition and declarations used to seek the order, a copy of any temporary protective or restraining order which is granted, and a copy of any protective or restraining order which is made permanent.

Confidentiality

Boise State University understands the sensitivity of requested information and shall make efforts to respect the privacy of the reporting party as much as possible. Retaliation for good faith reporting is prohibited.

Threat Assessments

Threat assessments are conducted by the University C.A.R.E. Team (established under University Policy #12080) and chaired by the Executive Director of Campus Security and Police Services, or his/her designee.

Threat assessments shall assess an individual's behavior if it has been reported as a potential threat to campus community safety.

The C.A.R.E. Team shall work with appropriate campus departments, law enforcement, and mental health agencies to expedite assessment and intervention. The team will also develop comprehensive fact-based assessment of students, employees, or other individuals who may present a threat to the university.

The Executive Director of Campus Security and Police Services may enlist (1) the expertise and assistance of resources outside the university as needed and (2) anyone with knowledge of the reported situation.

Violations of this policy may lead to actions (as appropriate) which may include mediation, counseling, exclusion from campus, suspension, expulsion, dismissal, and administrative sanctions. Those determined to have violated this policy may be excluded from campus as quickly as safety permits.

C.A.R.E. Team (Boise State Policy #12050)

Boise State University is committed to promoting and maintaining an environment where students, faculty, and staff participate in the educational process without compromising the health, safety, or welfare of themselves or others. The following guidelines create a campus based multi-disciplinary intervention and response team to engage students, faculty, and staff who may pose a threat to themselves or the community.

This policy is not a substitute for appropriate police or emergency involvement. Individuals are asked to call 9-1-1 if there is a threat of imminent physical harm.

The C.A.R.E. Team is a behavioral intervention team that designs reporting, screening, and assessment processes for disturbed, disturbing, or disruptive student and employee behavior, including the establishment of the website for reporting purposes. The C.A.R.E. Team also designs proceedings for mandating psychological assessments.

The C.A.R.E. Team:

- Responds to reports regarding students, faculty, staff, and third parties who exhibit disturbing or disruptive behavior that may pose a threat to themselves or the university community.
- Reviews reports of concern submitted to <http://care.boisestate.edu> about members of the Boise State University students, faculty, staff, and visitors.
- Balances the individual needs of the student, faculty, staff, or visitor with those of the greater campus community.
- Reviews reports of concern and conducts proactive intervention and assessment to prevent acts of violence or self-harm.
- Refers reports or incidents that do not require C.A.R.E. intervention to appropriate university authority, such as the Provost's office, academic advisors, Dean of Student's Office, or Health Services.
- Develops and monitors case management plans and appropriate documentation.
- In partnership with other university offices, the C.A.R.E. Team will:
 - Educate the campus community on active by-stander intervention, bias incidents, crisis management, monitoring behavior, and threat assessment.
 - Serve as consultants to members of the Boise State community to support in monitoring and assessing behavior and developing a plan of action to manage the behavior.
 - Assess available institutional and community resources and follow up on interventions, referrals, and reports.
 - Develops needed policies, protocols, and procedures to support C.A.R.E. functions around reports of concern.
 - Developing and implementing education and outreach plans to ensure that the campus community is aware of processes and contacts.

Retaliation, whether actual or threatened, destroys a sense of community and trust that is central to a quality environment. Therefore, retaliation against those who submit C.A.R.E. reports is not tolerated.

Crime Prevention and Security Awareness Programs

Boise State would much rather prevent crimes from occurring than react to them after the fact. A primary means for accomplishing this goal is the Boise State Crime Prevention Program. The Crime Prevention Program is based on the concepts of eliminating or minimizing criminal opportunities whenever possible and encouraging the campus community to be responsible for their own security and the security of others.

The following are Crime Prevention Programs in place at Boise State University:

1. **Emergency Telephones:** A number of well-marked emergency telephones are located throughout the campus, which have emergency and police communication capability.
2. **Alarm Systems:** A computer-based monitoring system that monitors a network of fire alarm systems. Intrusion detection alarms and a variety of other types of alarms are also utilized in various areas on campus.
3. **Security Surveys:** Surveys of exterior doors, exterior lighting, campus facilities, and campus grounds are conducted on a regular basis.
4. **Crime Prevention Publicity:** Crime prevention information is provided to the campus media.
5. **New Student Orientation:** A crime prevention presentation accompanied by brochures and other printed material is available to new students.
6. **Crime Prevention Presentations:** Crime prevention presentations are available to such campus groups or organizations, such as the Facilities Operations & Maintenance Department employees, commuter students, handicapped or disabled students, international students, student government, faculty and staff senates, recognized student organizations, intercollegiate athletics, etc.
7. **New Employee Orientation:** Crime prevention presentations accompanied by brochures and other printed material is available to new employees.
8. **Printed Crime Prevention Materials:** Crime prevention brochures and other printed material related to motor vehicle safety, bicycle security, residence hall security, personal safety, life safety, etc., are available at Campus Security and Police Services.
9. **Operation Identification:** Operation Identification, the engraving of serial numbers or owner-recognized numbers on items of value, is strongly promoted to the University community.
10. **Sexual Assault Awareness:** Sexual assault crime prevention presentations are given to any on-campus group requesting them. Additionally, scheduled presentations are arranged for residence hall students. This program is designed to assist males and females in identifying

and avoiding potential assault situations. The program offers tips towards avoiding and preventing sexual assaults.

11. **Residence Hall Security:** Crime prevention presentations, along with brochures and other printed materials, are available to residence hall students upon request.
12. **Community Policing Program:** Campus police officers are assigned groups of buildings and interact with building occupants to provide training and assistance.
13. **Building Coordinator Program:** A coordinator(s) is assigned to each building. These building coordinators participate in security surveys, receive unsecured condition notifications, and are trained in emergency response and building evacuation procedures.
14. **Bike Registration Program:** Bike registration is available 24 hours a day at Campus Security and Police Services office, located at 2245 University Drive. There is no fee to register a bike, and the service is available to everyone who works, lives, or studies on campus.
15. **Volunteer Campus Corp:** The Volunteer Campus Corp is staffed by individuals who share the goal of keeping the Boise State campus a safe and pleasant place to live, study, work, and visit. The Mission of the Volunteer Campus Corp is to provide a positive visible presence, to distribute crime prevention and safety information, and to provide assistance to security officers and police officers, students, staff, faculty, and campus guests. Campus Corp

volunteers have all passed BPD background checks and have received training and orientation on campus security protocols.

16. **Campus Watch Program:** Campus Watch is a cooperative effort between Campus Security and Police Services and the Facilities Operations & Maintenance Department. Custodial staff members receive quarterly training on personal safety and security issues, and are encouraged to watch for and report suspicious individuals and activity.

17. **Escort Services:** Escort service is available and will be provided upon request by calling Campus Security and Police Services at (208) 426-6911. This service is available 24 hours a day.

18. **Crime Stoppers:** The campus Crime Stoppers Program provides you the opportunity to call (208) 342-2677 or (208) 343-COPS to provide information you have about a crime that has occurred on campus. You can remain anonymous and may be eligible for a reward up to \$1,000.00 if your information leads to an arrest and filing of charges.
19. **Emergency Cell Phone Program:** Campus Security & Police Services distributes free cell phones for use by those individuals who do not have access to a cell phone. These cell phones only have access to 9-1-1 emergency services.
20. **Ask-A-Cop Program:** Access to Boise State law enforcement officials is available by e-mail. Submit law enforcement related questions to policeuniversitysecurity@boisestate.edu or Lt. Tony Plott at tplott@cityofboise.org. Police officers will respond to all appropriate questions.

21. **Online Crime Reporting:** Boise State students and employees have access to the BPD online crime reporting system. Criteria for submissions require that the crime is not an emergency, the incident occurred on the Boise State campus or within Boise City limits, and the suspect is unknown. Anyone wishing to report these crimes online should visit <http://www.boisepolice.org> (utilize the online service link).
22. **Child Identification Kits:** Free child identification kits are available 24 hours a day at Campus Security and Police Services' Office, located at 2245 University Drive.
23. **CCTV:** A network of cameras is utilized on campus in select areas to augment the Boise State personal safety and assets protection program.

Personal Safety and Crime Prevention Tips

The term "campus crime" tends to bring to mind a few obvious crimes, such as bicycle thefts or textbook thefts. Certainly, these thefts can and do prove very costly to victims. But a realization that any crime that occurs in society can and does occur on a campus puts you one step closer to avoid being a victim. Most crimes can be deterred, if not entirely prevented, by developing simple tasks and habits. While following the tips below cannot guarantee that you will not be a victim of a crime, your chances of being victimized can be reduced.

1. **Lock your car doors anytime you leave the car.** It takes only seconds to lock and unlock your car doors, and these seconds can save you from being victimized.
2. **Don't leave obvious valuables in plain view in your car.** Sometimes, temptation and availability is all that is needed to cause a would-be thief to attempt and complete a theft.
3. **Check the back seat of your car before you get in.** You may have an uninvited passenger.
4. **Lock your residence hall room, apartment, or house door.** This is probably the best simple deterrent available to protect your property and you. A criminal will often take the path of least resistance.
5. **Don't display large sums of cash or expensive jewelry.** Again, these actions may provide temptation to a thief. Cash and jewelry are often impossible to trace and easy for a thief to dispose of quickly.
6. **Know who is at the door before you open it.** Do you readily open the door to your resident hall room, apartment, or house without really knowing who is knocking or what they want? Know who is at the door and what they want. If it doesn't seem right, keep the door shut and communicate through the door.
7. **Walk with a friend when out late at night, and walk on designated pathways and well-lit areas.** There is truly safety in numbers.
8. **Secure bicycles through the wheel and frame with a high-quality cable AND lock or other approved device.** Campus Security and Police Services recommends using a "U Lock." Many of the stolen bicycles were not locked at the time of the theft.
9. **Register bicycles with Campus Security and Police Services.**
10. **Always pick a designated driver prior to attending festivities.**

11. **Don't impair your judgment with alcohol or illegal drugs.** Avoid accepting a ride from someone whose judgment is impaired by alcohol or drugs. Avoid taking a private walk with someone whose judgment is impaired by alcohol or drugs.
12. **Work with another student when working late at night in campus buildings.**
13. **Do not leave doors propped open.**
14. **Engrave valuable possessions with serial numbers or owner-recognized numbers.** This can be done through Campus Security and Police Services.
15. **Always know the location of the nearest telephone and how to report emergencies.**
16. **Keep emergency numbers near your phone.**
17. **Report any criminal or suspicious activities or other emergencies that occur on campus to Campus Security and Police Services.** It's easy to do. Report crime and testify against criminals. Every time a crime is reported, there is a chance to catch the criminal. When a crime goes unreported, the criminal wins hands down.
18. **In most sexual assaults, the victim and suspect knew each other prior to the assault.** Knowing someone does not guarantee a sexual assault will not occur.
19. **Limit your use of alcohol and be wary of accepting drinks from others, even people you know.**
20. **Make sure that you have verbal and sober consent from anyone before engaging in sexual activity.**

Chaffee Hall is of concrete masonry construction; "D" wing is sprinkled and "D" wing resident rooms have smoke control doors. The fire alarm system has smoke and heat detectors, manual pull stations, and audible and visible alarm notification devices. Stairwells are protected with fire doors.

Driscoll Hall is 100% sprinkled with 2 hour fire walls and smoke control doors between the suites. The fire alarm system has smoke and heat detectors, manual pull stations, and audible and visible alarm notification devices. Stairwells are protected with fire doors.

Keiser Hall is 100% sprinkled with 2 hour fire walls and fire dampers in the HVAC system. Stairwells are protected with 1 hour fire doors. The fire alarm system has smoke and heat detectors, manual pull stations, and audible and visible alarm notification devices. Stairwells are protected with fire doors.

Lincoln Townhouses are 100% sprinkled and each apartment has smoke detectors connected to the fire alarm system. There are also audible and visible warning devices in the stairwells.

Morrison Hall is 100% sprinkled with 2 hour fire walls and smoke control doors between the suites. The fire alarm system has smoke and heat detectors, manual pull stations, and audible and visible alarm notification devices. Stairwells are protected with fire doors.

Taylor Hall is 100% sprinkled with 2 hour fire walls and fire dampers in the HVAC system. Stairwells are protected with 1 hour fire doors. The fire alarm system has smoke and heat detectors, manual pull stations, and audible and visible alarm notification devices. Stairwells are protected with fire doors.

University Heights is of brick construction. Each apartment has standalone smoke detectors, exterior manual pull stations and exterior audible and visible alarm notification devices.

University Manor is of brick construction. Each apartment has standalone smoke detectors, exterior manual pull stations and exterior audible and visible alarm notification devices.

University Park is of concrete, masonry construction. Each apartment has standalone smoke detectors, exterior manual pull stations and exterior audible and visible alarm notification devices.

University Square is 100% sprinkled. The fire alarm system has smoke detectors, heat detectors, manual pull stations, and audible and visible alarm notification devices. Each apartment has standalone smoke detectors. Stairwells are protected with fire doors.

University Village has standalone smoke detectors, exterior manual pull stations and exterior audible and visible alarm notification devices. It also has two hour fire walls.

Appliances

The electrical system in the residence halls is not designed to carry heavy loads of electrical equipment. Students are required to be responsible in their use of appliances/electronics which includes proper and judicious use of multi-outlet strips and surge protectors. Extension cords are not permitted. Smoking

Smoking is prohibited on all Boise State University property including University Housing facilities. This policy can be found at: http://policy.boisestate.edu/wp-content/uploads/2011/05/9110_SmokefreeCampus.pdf.

Open Flames, Fireworks, Explosives, and Flammable Materials

Any item with an open flame or that burns (candles, incense, sterno stoves, alcohol burners, etc) is prohibited. Fireworks of any type are prohibited and may not be kept in your room/suite. Explosives of any kind, or equipment or materials to make explosives, are not allowed. Hazardous chemicals or flammable liquids are also prohibited, including propane tanks or gas cylinders for grills and camping equipment.

Emergency Evacuation (Including Fire Evacuation)

When an emergency evacuation is ordered or when audio or visual alarms are activated, all residents are required to evacuate the premises immediately and proceed to a designated Safe Assembly Location or where directed by emergency personnel or housing staff. Housing and Residence Life staff will assist in the basic evacuation of the facility and will help to coordinate re-entry into the building. Residents who fail to evacuate a building or take an excessive length of time to exit the building are subject to University disciplinary action. For more information, see Boise State policy #9220.

In event of fire or other emergency, call 911.

Fire Safety Education and Training

Students living in Housing and Residence Life review fire safety policies during New Student Orientation Housing presentations, reminded via email to review all Housing policies prior to moving in and once after moving in; and are addressed by the Resident Assistant (RA) at their first floor meeting of the year.

Appendix A

Sex Offenses Definitions per the National Incident-Based Reporting System Edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program

Sex Offenses – Forcible: Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person’s will; or not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent. There are four categories that are counted as “Sex Offenses – Forcible” for Clery purposes. These include the following:

- **Forcible Rape:** The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against the person’s will; or, not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.
- **Forcible Sodomy:** Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against the person’s will; or, not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.
- **Sexual Assault with an Object:** The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person’s will; or, not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.
- **Forcible Folding:** The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person’s will; or, not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Sex Offenses – Non-Forcible: Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse. There are two categories that are counted as “Sex Offenses – Non-Forcible” for Clery purposes. These include the following:

- **Incest:** Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.
- **Statutory Rape:** Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Clery Crime Definitions Per the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggressive bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property, etc.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes, this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned-including joy riding.)

Manslaughter by Negligence: The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or person by force or threat of force, violence, and/or causing the victim fear.

Larceny: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

Vandalism: To willfully or maliciously destroy, injure, disfigure, or deface any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

Weapons Law Violations: The violations of law or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Drug Law Violations: Violations of State and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadones); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Liquor law Violations: Violations of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Offense Definitions relating to Hate/Bias Related Crime Statistics as per the UCR Hate Crime Reporting Guidelines

Simple Assault: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.

Intimidation: To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

Geography definitions from the Clery Act

On-Campus: (1) Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls; and (2) Any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified in paragraph (1), that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or retail vendor).

Non-Campus Building or Property: (1) Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or (2) Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of or in relation to the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Public Property: All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.
